Lord Archbishop of York, Primate of England and Metropolitan lawfully constituted in the sum of [one hundred and forty Pounds](#) of good and lawful Money of Great Britain, to be paid to the said Commissary or his true and lawful Attorney, Executors, Administrators or Assigns; to the which Payment well and truly to be made. We bind us and every of us, jointly and severally for and in the whole, our and every of our Heirs, executors and Administrators, and every of them firmly by these Presents Sealed with our Seals. The Condition of this Obligation is such, That if [the above bound Sarah JUBB widow relict and Administratrix](#) Of all and singular the Goods, Chattels and credits of [John JUBB, Blacksmith Late of Silkstone And Diocese of York, deceased](#) do make or cause to be made a true and perfect Inventory of all and singular the Goods, Chattels and Credits of the said deceased, which have or shall come to the Hands, Possession or Knowledge of [her](#) The said [Sarah JUBB](#) Or into the Hands and Possession of any other Person or Persons for [her](#) And the same so made, do exhibit, or caused to be Exhibited into the Registry of the Exchequer Court in York at or before the [thirty first day of January](#) Next

ensuing, And the same Goods, Chattels and Credits and all other the Goods, Chattels and Credits of the said Deceased at the time of his Death which at any time after shall come to the Hands or possession of the said Sarah JUBB Or into the Hands and Possession of any other Person or Persons for her do well and truly Administer according to the Law. And further do make, or cause to be made a true and just account of her said Administration at or before the thirtyfirst Day of July next ensuing, and all the Rest and residue of the said Goods, Chattels and credits, which shall be found remaining upon the said Administratrix Account the same being first examined and allowed of by the Judge or Judges for the time being, of the said Court shall deliver and pay unto such person or persons respectively, as the said Judge or Judges by his or their Decree or Sentence pursuant to the true Intent and Meaning of the Act of Parliament in that behalf made, shall limit and appoint. Case (of drawers)	Chest (of drawers)
Fat	Vat or container?
Imprimis	First, firstly
Kit, kitt, kitte	a staved tub such as a cooper would make, with a cover, or a bucket or small barrel
Prizer	One who appraises
Range	a cooking/baking stove, but the OED states "The precise meaning in some of the older instances of the word is not clear...'roasting-range'...is perhaps the sense of the earliest quotations" - or high fender or fire-guard (modern Lincolnshire dialect) - or a sieve or strainer for liquids
Hustlement	household furniture; chiefly pl. articles of furniture, household goods
